

CONNECTICUTINDERAGE PRINKINGLAWS

Drinking by college students has serious consequences both to their own health and safety and to their larger college communities According to the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIA Alfa) king by college students aged 18 to 24 contributes to an estimated 1,825 student deaths, 599,000 student injuries, and 97,000 cases of sexual assault or date rape each year.

As students and their parents consider the health and safety consequences of student drinking, they should also be aware of Connecticut laws concerning underage drinking and social hosting. Violational legal liability, particularly if they act as social hosts.

Social Hosting

A violation of this provision is a class A misdemeanor
- x The social hosting law prohibits hosting a party where anyone under 21 consumes alcohol even if the host does not provide the **la**ohol to the minors.
- x Further, the law requires such persowho knows that a minor possesses alcohol illegally to make reasonable efforts to stop it.

Potential Consequences

x In addition to criminal pnalties, social hosting or supplying alcohol to others may result in civil liability for injuries or property damage that result, including alcohol poisoning, sexual assault, or death.

Other Reevant Connecticut Laws

x Connecticut law prohibits anyone **fro**driving a motor vehicle while drinking alcohol or while under the influence of alcohol! Potential penalties for violating this prohibition include fine, imprisonment, participation in an alcohol education and treatment program, license or nonresident operating privilege.
